



Grant Overview Snapshot

What we want to achieve

Our vision is for a more giving Tasmania and to change the lives of our fellow Tasmanians.

What is Impact 100 Tasmania?

We are Tasmanians of all ages and backgrounds pooling our resources to make a lasting positive impact on the quality of life in our state.

How does it work?

The **Impact 100 Tasmania** model is simple. Members donate \$1,000 per annum, creating a single grant of \$100,000 or the final amount raised in that year. Accumulated funds each year from the membership are granted to a single organisation or, in some cases where funds accumulated exceed \$100,000 per annum, these may be split between multiple organisations.

Who can apply?

Impact 100 Tasmania Grants are open to all registered Tasmanian Charities for projects within Tasmania that meet the following criteria:

- have both Deductible Gift Recipient 1 (DGR1) and Tax Concessional Charity status (TCC) from the Australian Taxation Office;
- have been operating for at least 15 months;
- have an annual revenue under \$5 million; and
- conduct projects within Tasmania that benefit Tasmanians.

What are the areas for the Grants?

The five areas for grant applications are:

- **Arts & Culture** - Initiatives that cultivate, develop, and enhance the cultural and artistic climate in Tasmania;
- **Education** - Initiatives that provide learning opportunities or improve access to education for children and/or adults in Tasmania;
- **Environment** - Initiatives that restore, preserve, revitalise or enhance the natural or recreational surroundings of Tasmania;
- **Health & Wellness** - Initiatives that positively impact the mental and/or physical well-being of people in Tasmania; and
- **Family & Community** - Initiatives that strengthen and enhance the lives of children, families and communities in Tasmania.

In 2018 Impact 100 Tasmania will consider applications for projects that:

- Benefit the Tasmanian community;
- That are not currently funded by a significant other organisation;
- Target a specific project for a specific duration with specific measured goals to be achieved;
- Demonstrate ongoing benefit to the community and or the organisations sustainability; and
- Are not limited to any one cause, but may include the homeless, disadvantaged, youth, literacy, elderly, medical, indigenous, and community.

The grant must be expended within 12 months of it being received.

What makes a grant competitive?

All grant applications must address the key five areas and need to:

- Support new answers to challenging questions or strengthen/sustain successful solutions;
- Be compelling and make a significant and measurable difference to the area it addresses; and
- Be a project able to be completed within a twelve-month timeline.

Who assesses the grant applications?

In the initial and second round assessment process (*refer to process to grant application section below) the Focus Assessment Committees (FACs) in each of the five key areas initially assess application against agreed criteria. These assessments are listed in order of merit and presented at the 1st and 2nd assessment nights to the full Grant Subcommittee Members and donors who wish to participate in voting for shortlisted submissions.

What are the Focus Assessment Committees (FAC) and what is their role?

Membership of FACs consists of donors with an interest in any of the five areas. Members may serve on one or more FACs to review grant applications.

Process for Grant Application

The grant process will take place in 3 stages.

- 1A. An expression of interest (short application) which addresses criteria is required. Applications are reviewed at the first assessment night attended by interested donors, and Impact 100 Tasmania committee members.
- 1B. Those shortlisted (up to 10) for the second round are asked to submit a more detailed application against required criteria.
- 2 A. Once received, applications are reviewed against criteria by Co-Chairs of FACs responsible for respective areas and presented to all interested donors for voting.
- 2C. Finalists (4-6) are chosen for final shortlist and a reference check and site visit occurs. This is conducted by FAC Co-Chairs, supported by Impact 100 Tasmania grant sub-committee members.
- 3. Grants Award Night. Finalists are asked to give a 10-minute presentation. Donors who attend the Awards Night vote for the final grant recipient.

What are the reporting requirements for the winner of the Grant?

The successful grant recipient is expected to report quarterly on progress against agreed milestones and outcomes.

Timelines for 2018

- Grant applications open on 28 February 2018 and close on April 27th 2018.
- Unsuccessful and successful applicants for the first round will be notified on 11 June 2018.
- Invitation to participate in Round 2 and requirement to complete a longer application opens on 11 June 2018 and close on July 20, 2018.
- Final shortlisted applicants advised 3 September 2018 and invited to prepare presentation for award's night.
- Presentation to the Awards Night November 2018
